This small timber framed corrugated iron former church has a gable colorbond roof (re-roofed in 2003) with a lean-to roof to the south which covers a corrugated iron clad extension. To the apex of the west end of the main gable there is a timber Celtic cross. The main double timber entry doors are to the centre of the east facade with a small timber framed vent to the centre of the gable end. A bullnose verandah has been added to protect this door in recent times. Windows are timber framed with a metal security grille to the exterior. The hall has light green walls and a red roof. An ablution building was constructed to the north set behind brick walls in c 1999.

The Hall was opened in the Geraldton suburb of Wonthella on 24

September 1939 for use as a l subcrurch

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designed to accommodate a total of 100 pupils and 60 parishioners. In 1968, St. Patrick's at Wonthella closed and has, in recent years been used by the Irish Club. (Source: Marchant James, R., p.273-4)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This small conugated iron building has high historic significance for its previous use as a catholic church and school and for its association with Priest-Architect John Hawes, who was responsible for the design of numerous other buildings in Geraldton including the St. Francis Xavier Cathedral, the Hermitage and Nazareth House. The building is a unique example of Hawes' work given its simple form, basic design and use of construction materials. Further, the place has social significance for its current use as the headquarters of the Irish community in Geraldton.
