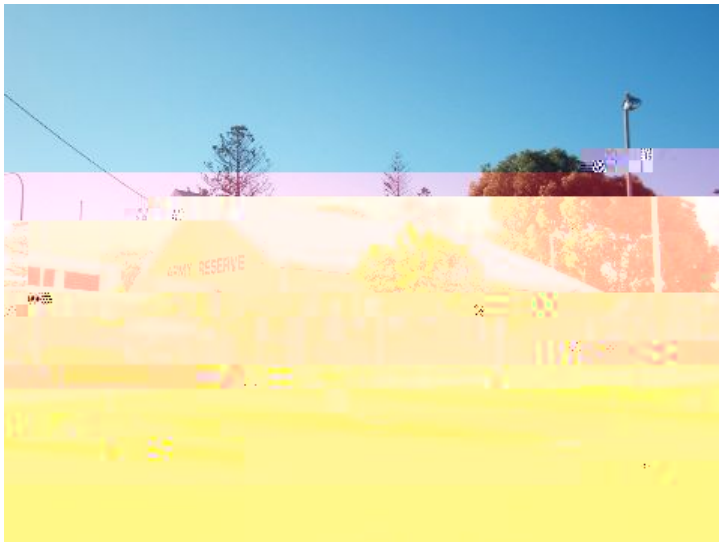

Sited on a prominent corner in Geraldton this large comugated iron clad hall has a comugated iron gable roof. To the rear remnants of the original stone structure have been incorporated into the existing hall. Windows to the hall are mostly timber framed and double hung with a small awning window to the side of the stone section. Entrances to the front and south sides have double timber doors with a curved comugated iron entry porch which is supported on metal posts. Entry to the rear stone section is via steel frame entry steps to a single door. Adjoining the north elevation, there is a toilet block and a lesser hall.

It is believed that the original limestone building was built c 1890s. At this time the building was much larger, with stables adjoining the west elevation. Stone foundations of this structure are still evident beneath the present comugated iron hall. The comugated iron extensions were built c 1890s - this is an estimate based on photographic evidence. These extensions have been altered throughout the years and are at present significantly larger than the initial structure. Old photographs also reveal

that the old stone section was pointed and had red brick quoining around the windows and doors. The hall was the centre of much social interaction, with local dances held there as well as games nights. The hall was commonly referred to as 'the cow shed'. During the 1920s the hall and adjacent yard were used for the military training of young school boys.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Army Reserves Hall has considerable historic significance for its association with the defence forces in Geraldton from the 1890s. Indeed it is the oldest operating drill hall in Western Australia. Given its prominent location and large scale the place has some aesthetic value. Further the place has some social significance being used as venue for dances and other gatherings and its current use by the Army Reserves. It is highly

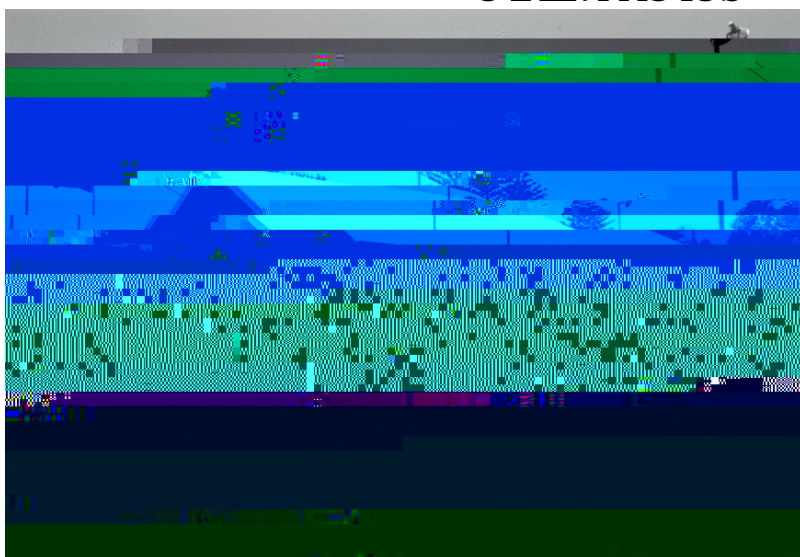
