Lily Cottage is located immediately to the west of Brand Highway and approximately 300 metres to the north of Phillips Road. A steeply pitched combination hipped and gable roof covers a small 'T shaped house of local stone and corrugated iron construction. There are verandahs to three sides which feature a decorative scalloped valance. A lean-to to the rear is clad with corrugated iron sheets. Immediately to the south are some stone and brick outbuildings with corrugated iron roofs.

In 1904 the cottage was owned by G. Brand and occupied by Thomas Kember. This was then the home of Francis Gow Amstrong and his family. Amstrong was a former Mayor of Geraldton. Lily Cottage was later owned by Tim and Meta Anderson (nee Harrison). The place is also known as Anderson Cottage. The current owners, Mrand Mrs Pratt, who have owned the property for over 25 years, claim that a blacksmiths shop was located in the adjacent outbuildings.
