Lily Cottage is located immediately to the west of Brand Highway and approximately 300 metres to the north of Phillips Road. A steeply pitched combination hipped and gable roof covers a small 'T' shaped house of local stone and comugated iron construction. There are verandahs to three sides which feature a decorative scalloped valance. A lean-to to the rear is clad with comugated iron sheets. Immediately to the south are some stone and brick outbuildings with comugated iron roofs.

In 1904 the cottage was owned by G. Brand and occupied by Thomas Kember. This was then the home of Francis Gow Armstrong and his family. Armstrong was a former Mayor of Geraldton. Lily Cottage was later owned by Tim and Meta Anderson (nee Hamison). The place is also known as Anderson Cottage. The current owners, Mr and Mrs Pratt, who have owned the property for over 25 years, claim that a blacksmiths shop was located in the adjacent outbuildings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lily Cottage has some historic significance as a residence that has existed on the Front Flats for over 130 years. Although the place has been altered over the years, it still retains much of its original character, which is enhanced by the steeply pitched roof and decorative valance. This, combined with its prominent location on the Brand Highway, makes Lily Cottage an important element of the built environment of the Front Flats.
