Set in an elevated position, this stone building has a steeply pitched conugated iron roof which extends to cover the central verandah. The verandah, which is supported on timber posts, is accessed via timber stairs with a metal handrail. Two stone rooms either side of the verandah are covered with hipped conugated iron roofs. Windows to the place are timber framed and double hung with small panes. There is a large stone room attached to the south of the house and a lean-to roof to the rear. The Carob tree often associated with the house has died while the olive tree is located to the north east of the house.

HISTORY

Mount Pleasant was built using locally quaried stone around 1860 as a family home for Frederick and Fredericka Waldeck, one of the first families to purchase farming land at Greenough. Frederick Waldeck was granted Victoria Locations 76 and 77, comprising 202 acres, in April 1857, however the Waldecks did not settle in Greenough until early 1860. The Waldecks were staunch Wesleyan community members and the house was often used as a gathering place for regular fellowship meetings before the opening of Wesley Church in 1870. [Place No. 49] Mount Pleasant was

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also used as a doctor's surgery, consulting rooms and post office, as Frederick's son, William, was the Postmaster from 1866 until 1874. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Mount Pleasant has high historic significance as one of the earliest remaining houses built on the Front Flats. The place has further significance given its close association with the Waldeck family, who were early settlers and prominent members of the Greenough community. The house has considerable aesthetic appeal which is enhanced by its elevated position with commanding views over the surrounding countryside, its good condition and high integrity. This combined with the use of local stone and original facade make the place an important component of the built heritage of Greenough.
